

Our girls love reading the "The Great Adventure Storybook" * as a family and it is often their book of choice at bedtime. It introduces the Bible in a way that is engaging and easy to understand. One feature we really like is the rosary bead symbol. The symbol is found beside the

Bible story for each of the twenty mysteries. We like being able to read the stories while praying the rosary so the girls have a better understanding of each mystery. It also has a cross symbol that is found next to the Bible story for each of the seven sacraments. There are other features of the book that we will use as our girls get older including conversation starter questions. We would recommend this book for any family looking to learn the Bible together in a kid friendly way.

How to make a good CONFESSION

Through this Sacrament, Christ forgives the sins that the members of his Church commit after baptism.

Before confession

- 1. Try to remember the sins you committed since your last good confession.
- 2. Be sorry for your sins.
- 3. Have the intention to sin no more.

At confession with a priest

- 4. Telling the priest when your last good confession was. Then confess your sins simply and honestly.
- 5. Listen to the advice and the penance. (Do your penance after you come out of the confessional, as soon as possible.)
- 6. Finally, express your sorrow for the sins confessed in an Act of contrition.

The altar of sacrifice is stripped in silence and the crucifix covered or removed from the sanctuary. Masses will not be offered again until the Easter Vigil Service.

Good Friday: Today the Church celebrates the Passion and Death of her Lord.

The celebrant wears red Mass vestments to honor the Lamb whose blood saves us.

Christians of earlier centuries venerated the true cross. Yet every image of the cross visibly brings to mind Him who suffered and died for us. The liturgy reaches its high point D in the arrival of the cross. If veiled, it is presented to the celebrant who unveils it. Three times he proclaims "Behold the wood of the Cross on which hung the salvation of the world". Each time we kneel and respond, "Come, let us adore".
