Pastor's Message

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we approach the days of the events of our salvation, it is good to reflect on the ways in which the Passion of Christ was the cause of our salvation. St. Thomas Aquinas, in *Summa Theologiae* III, Q. 48, Art. 6, teaches that there is a twofold efficient cause: the principal and the instrumental. The **principal efficient cause** of man's salvation is God Himself. However, since Christ's humanity is the "instrument of the Divinity," all of Christ's actions and sufferings operate **instrumentally**, by the power of His

Godhead, for the salvation of mankind. Therefore, Christ's Passion brings about our salvation efficiently.

Let us now consider the **manners** in which the Passion of Christ caused our salvation:

- 1.By efficiency, in relation to His <u>Divinity</u>. Only the Divine Nature could offer a price of infinite value. Thus, the Passion of Christ, as united to His Divinity, efficiently brought about our salvation.
- 2. **By merit**, in relation to the <u>will</u> of the soul of Christ. Since merit arises from acts of the will, Christ merited salvation for us through His freely accepted sufferings.
- 3. **By satisfaction**, in relation to the <u>flesh</u> of Christ. Because the flesh is capable of receiving punishment, Christ, through His bodily suffering, satisfied the debt we owed and freed us from the penalty of sin.
- 4.By redemption, in relation to the price of His blood. As Scripture says, "Without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness of sin" (Heb 9:22), and "By your blood you ransomed for God those from every tribe and tongue, people and nation" (Rev 5:9). The Passion of Christ redeemed us by paying the price of our sins.
- 5.**By sacrifice**, in relation to the <u>offering</u> of His Passion to God. Christ's offering was a true and perfect sacrifice, reconciling humanity with God.

As we enter more deeply into the mystery of Christ's Passion during this sacred time, let us renew our gratitude for the immense love He showed us on the Cross. May the Blessed Virgin Mary, who stood at the foot of the Cross, help us to contemplate the mystery of our salvation with faith and love.

GOSPEL John 8.1-11of Sun. April 6
